Take a closer look

When a home disintegrates, the physical and emotional repercussions are disastrous both for the family and wider community

No sanitation because of discrimination Fear and ignorance about contracting HIV/AIDS often leads to families like Nai's being treated unjustly and denied access to water and sanitation in their community

The roof is unstable

With no money for corrugated iron, the family patches up the roof with palm leaves strapped together

The walls are decaying

Large holes appear in the walls where the palm leaves have worn and decayed leaving little privacy or protection

The floor has gaping holes With the wind and rain coming through the roof and walls, the floor is rotting and becoming unstable

The stilts are infested with woodworm

Woodworm is rife and damaging the stilts that are barely supporting the house



Nai Savy's story

It's not just the walls that are falling apart at Nai Savy's house in Cambodia. Poverty housing robs people of their health, hope, safety and dignity.

For years, Nai Savy and her three children have dreamed of living in a safe, healthy home. After her husband died, Nai has struggled to hold her home and family life together.

Waking at 5am, Nai goes to work in the rice fields and earns around £1.50 a day. She has barely enough to feed her children and support them through school.

When the storms and heavy rains come, Nai fears for her children's lives. Instead of protecting them, their home becomes a danger and the family has to run to a neighbour's house for refuge.

Being HIV positive, Nai is facing poor health and unfair discrimination in her community. Her children are constantly ill because of their home environment. Any money that could be spent on repairing the home ends up being spent on medicines.
