FOUNDATIONS FIRST

London's latest iconic structure, The Shard, was officially opened in July. The 310m construction dominates the skyline, supported by 53m of foundations underground. Firm foundations are essential to the success of buildings like The Shard and ordinary houses alike. But they're also absolutely vital in our own lives, and at Habitat for Humanity we believe that one of the most important foundations is a HOME. It's the basis upon which we build our lives and helps us to enjoy improved health, increased opportunities for employment and education and supports family and community life. Here are four stories of the foundations you are helping families around the world to establish.

HOME = HEALTH

In many former Soviet countries in Central Asia, much of the population live in old apartment blocks which often have no water, no sanitation, no heating and temperamental electricity. Unsurprisingly, many of those who live there suffer constantly with health problems.

Almazbek, his wife, three sons and elderly parents lived this way for many years in Kyrgyzstan. So he was delighted when the government offered him a small plot of land so that he could move out of his expensive and desperately inadequate rented flat and start to rebuild his life. But it was with the help of Habitat for Humanity that Almazbek was able to turn his new house into a real home, and install proper heating systems.



Mouldy walls are a thing of the past and with warmth to protect them from the harsh winters the family have a much healthier and happier life.

HOME = OPPORTUNITY

Uncertainty is a constant worry for Champika, as her husband spends many weeks out at sea working as a fisherman. There are many days when he doesn't catch anything at all and so the family have to move from house to house in search of an affordable home.

Such a lifestyle is greatly unsettling, especially for the couple's two eldest sons who have to wake every day at 4.30am to walk many miles to school. They enjoy learning and study long into the night with the aid of an oil lamp, but their two-roomed house they share with three other families is far from conducive to studying.

For twelve years Champika has worked tirelessly towards a stable, safe home for her family, but she is increasingly concerned about the detrimental effect the lack of stability and security will have on her children.

But all that is about to change. This year, Champika will have the opportunity to build a secure home in a safe community where her children will be able to live life to the full.



HOME = MY FAMILY

In her eagerness to leave her terribly unhappy childhood home in Ulaanbaatar, Maitsetset married when she was just 18 years old. She and her husband moved into her mother-in-law's home and soon her first baby was born. But by the time her second son was just six months old, Maitsetset's husband left and the young family had to move into her uncle's house where her mother was living. When her uncle asked Maitsetset, now working as a cleaner, to move out, arguments erupted within the family.

"I want my children to come home straight from school and do their homework in peace," says Maitsetset. "I want them to become educated people whose lives are better than their mother's." But the conflict between her mother and uncle means the boys are fearful of coming home.

All this is about to change as, in partnership with Habitat for Humanity, Maitsetset, her sons and her mother finally have the opportunity to live united as a family in a safe home. The cycle of deprivation and fear that has trapped them for so long will stop here. A new home will unite this family with hope for the future.



HOME = EVERYONE

Habitat for Humanity is working in Bolivia for gender equal access to land by providing women living in the slums of Cochabamba with training on how to advocate for law change, claim their rights and access affordable loans to cover costs of acquiring land tenure.

In the last year 128 women have been trained at Habitat for Humanity's School of Women Leaders on Land Tenure and are now working with the municipal government of Cochabamba as advocates for change and gender equality in Bolivia's land rights system.

One of the participants is Margarita. For women like her participation in the programme has meant more than simply raising awareness. "We realise we have value as women," she says. "I want to know more myself and help others. We were talking about starting a project to help children in the community and this is the vision I have and this is thanks to Habitat for Humanity and I am so grateful for all I am learning."



The knock on effects of this project will surely bring about change for everyone in the community.

FURTHER THAN THE EYE CAN SEE



When we think of secure housing we generally start with a vision of bricks and mortar, but strong foundations go further than the eye can see. Having secure land rights is the foundation for any decent shelter; without them safe and permanent housing is virtually impossible to achieve.

There are almost a billion people living without secure tenure in informal urban settlements in the developing world. As a result, individuals are more likely to be at risk of eviction and less likely to have access to infrastructure like water and sanitation. There is little incentive to improve your house or make necessary repairs if you know eviction could be around the next corner. As a result many continue to live in abhorrent conditions. This then has an adverse impact on health; a family's ability to earn an income; care for each other and their ability to improve their neighbourhood.

For so many of the world's poor people, securing tenure to the land they work or live on is a difficult and complex process. For conventional land registration people need accurate documents and a formal and rigid system in which they are recorded. This is a huge obstacle. Together with a lack of money and influence and land offices that are too far away, for many it is impossible even to begin the process.

FACT BOX (SOURCE - UN):

- Only 3% of land in the world is owned by women
- In 2005 an estimated 934 billion people in the world's cities lived without secure tenure
- Article 17 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that: (1) Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others; and (2) No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property
- In the developing world 36% of urban dwellers live in slums
- More than 90% of the rural population of sub-Saharan Africa access land via legally insecure customary and informal tenure systems

In urban and in rural areas, if families have no legal rights to the land or the home that they live in, the future (immediate and long-term) is uncertain and wrought with danger. The process for securing tenure is expensive and complicated, and requires the community and local or national governments to work together. In developing countries this can take years.

FURTHER THAN THE EYE CAN SEE





In Cochabamba's District 9, the city continues to sprawl at a frightening rate, without access to water, sanitation, transport or electricity. Many who move to the everexpanding city have been sold land originally intended for farming under false pretences. Unbeknownst to them, they don't have legal rights to the land they live on and are at risk of extortion and eviction. With complicated histories of ownerships, families now occupying the land may pay rent to a number of individuals or community leaders. Without knowledge of their rights there is little they can do to change the situation.

In places like Cochabamba registering land is both complicated and expensive. Women often endure greater discrimination as policy and planning decisions made in traditionally machismo societies often don't take their concerns or needs into account at all. Inherent racism and gender-based discrimination leaves much of the population denied access to land rights completely. Habitat for Humanity are challenging these injustices head on in Bolivia, where we've been training women to know their rights and to advocate to local and national government through a school of Women Leaders. As a result of our intervention there has even been a direct amendment to the law, which means that women can now have their names on property documents. This is a significant achievement in a culture like Bolivia's.

Another consequence of our intervention has been a commitment from government to sort out the land rights in the city. Land rights in this country have been in a mess for many years but local governments have committed to stopping unrestricted urban sprawl and sorting out land rights for the inhabitants within two years. Habitat for Humanity is establishing a watchdog

group to ensure the governments keep their promises.



FURTHER THAN THE EYE CAN SEE





Like many sub-Saharan countries, children in the Mulanje district of southern Malawi are losing their parents to HIV/AIDs at a frightening rate. With the death of their parents, so many children also lose their homes and with them basic security and health. It may seem desperately brutal but distant family members often arrive to claim ownership of a dead relative's home leaving children on the streets. For those children who do stay in their homes it is probable that the cost of rent or home maintenance will be too high for them to pay anyway.

On its own the loss of one or both parents to a condition that is so stigmatised is incredibly isolating. Couple it with the loss of a home and the security that provides and the damage done to children can be irreversible.

For these reasons, as well as building homes and providing training on HIV prevention for children in Malawi, Habitat

for Humanity is also training individuals on inheritance rights and writing wills. These simple practices can help families to plan for an uncertain future, with the knowledge that their children will not lose their homes if their parents, guardians or caregivers should die or become seriously ill.

Laws, rights and political structures that govern land tenure vary drastically from country to country. By working through our network of local partners, Habitat for Humanity can make sure the needs of families in individual communities are met in the most appropriate way.

In Bolivia, Malawi and the many other countries we work in we can ensure families have the best foundation possible. With proper secure tenure and land rights, home becomes a safe and secure springboard for a healthy life filled with opportunities for the whole family and wider community.

AT HOME: OUR WORK IN GB

Did you know there are 279,000 long term empty properties in England that could be used by families who need affordable homes? In the UK there are thousands of families who long for a decent and safe place to live, and one of these homes could be just what they need.

Renovating empty properties is a cost effective and environmentally friendly way of regenerating communities, which is why Habitat for Humanity is delighted to have received funding for our 'Empty Homes' scheme from the government's Empty Homes Funding.

In June, Julia Kendell, a familiar face from BBC One's DIY SOS, visited the project site in Dagenham, East London, as our committed volunteer force started work on a number of properties. The work of renovating existing properties is of increasing importance as government predicts that England, in particular, is facing a "growing housing crisis." Recent government reports estimate that the country will face shortfall of 750,000 homes by 2025.

We are partnering with various local authorities, housing associations, community organisations and private owners. So if you know of an empty property in London, Tamworth or Banbury and Bicester that could do with a new lease of life, why not contact us? Watch this space for more details as we expand our 'Empty Homes' programme throughout the UK.

SUPPORTING HOMELESS PROJECTS

Our construction experience was put to good use at the start of the year as Habitat for Humanity partnered with the Soup Kitchen at the American Church on Tottenham Court Road, London to build a new cabin to serve free meals from. Throughout the spring, volunteers from companies, the church and the local community, united to help Habitat for Humanity create a permanent, warm and secure place for the community, which opened its doors on 28th April.

The Soup Kitchen provides hot meals, clothing and toiletries for the homeless, elderly, poor and lonely and helps them access welfare services. It won't solve all their problems, but providing a safe and welcoming haven for a couple of hours a day will make life just that bit better. The project is often the only secure foundation in many people's lives and is a vital step in improving the living conditions of some of our country's most vulnerable people.



THE PHILIPPINES IN PICTURES



In December 2011 Inday Rosalia and her family were amongst 284,610 individuals who were made homeless after Typhoon Washi ravaged the Philippines. For more than four months they made their home in a small, tented community. In May the family's ordeal finally came to an end, when, along with 400 other families, they moved into their brand new Habitat for Humanity home.



MARY ROSIKA



For Mary Rosika, her husband, Nandakumar, and their three young children space and privacy are luxuries they can't afford. Their one-room wooden shack in Negombo, Sri Lanka provides little shelter or protection. When it rains the family have to place all their belongings on their bed to prevent rising floodwaters from ruining them. Nandakumar occasionally works at a food stall and can earn up to \$3 per day, but work is unpredictable, so the family have no hope of saving enough money to rebuild or repair their home.

To make the cramped conditions even worse, the family have no bathroom and are forced to use their neighbour's toilet. Such unsanitary conditions mean the children are frequently sick and miss a lot of school. "All I want is to

give my children a good future," says Mary.

Despite her desperate situation, Mary has never lost her dream of having a safe and clean home. About ten years ago she joined with some friends to form the Association of the Homeless and has been working tirelessly to secure land and a home for her family ever since. Her hard work has finally paid off as Mary will be one of the beneficiaries of Habitat for Humanity's Rebuild Sri Lanka event in August.

"God has answered our prayers," says Mary with delight. "My children will be strong and healthy in the future and will be able to attend school regularly. We are confident that by getting a new home, our entire lifestyle will change for the better."

WEATHERING THE STORM



There are many things that can shake the foundations of our life – losing a job, illness, natural disasters, wars and bereavement. All over the world we work to help people to have decent homes; homes which will withstand the disasters that life throws at us; or to rebuild homes once the disasters have struck.

Earlier this year in our appeal we told you about Guadelupe, a single mother from Guatemala whose life had been devastated, twice, by natural disasters. With the help of Habitat for Humanity she built a safe and decent home to ensure that next time disaster strikes she and her family will be safe. There are so many more stories like hers. Take, for example, Juan and his son Juan Pablo.

When Hurricane Agatha struck Guatemala in May 2010, Juan's home was in the pathway of one of the landslides that resulted from the heavy rains. Not only did he lose his house; his wife and youngest son were also killed during the storm. In the blink of an eye Juan's world collapsed. But, thankfully, Habitat for Humanity was there to help Juan rebuild his home as he dealt with his loss.

A year on since Juan completed his new home, the difference it has made to his life is undeniable. "This was an emergency," remembers Juan. "Our house was destroyed. Thank God that they came and supported us so we could have this house."

The Habitat for Humanity home has sturdy cement block walls, metal doors, and is located far from the mountains and the threat of any future landslides. It is a safe and warm home where Juan and Juan Pablo are protected from the elements and can stay healthy.

The new house sits among a cluster of others near to Juan's parents and siblings. The additional support of his family has been vitally important as this father and son have been



rebuilding their lives after the tragedy of the hurricane. Juan's mother, Rosenda, and his sisters help them by cooking, doing laundry, and looking after Juan Pablo.

Meanwhile, Juan Pablo is excited to be starting school this year. When asked about the changes in their life Juan says, "Well, thank God that now is more tranquil than last year. Last year was very sad. But now, with God's help, my son will continue to grow." Juan's father, Julian, knows that by providing his son with adequate housing Habitat for Humanity has been instrumental in ensuring his son and grandson's physical and emotional recovery.

Your support has been instrumental in giving a happy ending to what started out as such a tragic story. Now this family have a stable home, they can at last start to rebuild their lives.
